However, a federal judge temporarily blocked the freeze, allowing mandatory programs like Medicaid to continue.

Medicaid payment processing was inaccessible on Tuesday morning due to a federal funding freeze. However, the White House clarified in a follow-up memo that Medicaid should not be affected, and by late Tuesday afternoon, the administration stated that the Medicaid payment portal was restored. No payments were officially reported as stopped, but states temporarily experienced difficulty accessing funds.

Current Medicaid Status:

- 1. Medicaid was inaccessible Tuesday morning but restored by the afternoon.
- 2. No payments were officially reported as halted.
- 3. Some states (Illinois, Florida, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Georgia) had trouble accessing Medicaid funds earlier in the day.
- 4. There are no reported Medicaid shutdowns as of now.

Future Medicaid Cuts:

- 1. No immediate cuts have been implemented.
- 2. However, House Republicans are considering reductions, such as per capita caps and work requirements (Georgetown CCF, 01/09/2025).

Cash Pay Services:

Operating on a cash-pay basis is permissible for physical therapists in Hawaii. This model enables us to offer services to patients who prefer not to use insurance or who are uninsured. However, it's crucial to ensure that our cash pay practices comply with all relevant laws and regulations, including those related to "surprise billing." As of January 1, 2022, new rules require that we provide good faith estimates of the costs of services to uninsured or self-pay patients.

Implications for Insurance Contracts:

While we can offer cash pay services, we must carefully review our contracts with insurance providers. Some agreements may have clauses that restrict or prohibit offering services outside of the insurance network or accepting cash payments for services covered by insurance. It's essential to understand these terms to avoid potential breaches of contract.

February 4, 2025 - Federal Funding Freeze: Uncertainty for Medicaid and Hawaii's Most Vulnerable

The situation regarding the federal funding freeze and its impact on Medicaid has evolved. On January 28, 2025, President Trump's administration issued an order to temporarily halt federal grants and loans to review spending, which led to widespread confusion and disruptions in Medicaid payment portals across all 50 states. This action caused significant concern, given that Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program cover over 79 million Americans, funding nearly 40% of births in the U.S.

In response to the freeze, a federal judge issued a temporary stay, allowing mandatory programs like Medicaid to continue operating. Despite this, the initial freeze and subsequent legal actions have created uncertainty for organizations that rely on federal funding, including those in Hawaii. In Hawaii, Medicaid is crucial, covering about half of the state's children and a third of residents. Any reduction in federal funding could significantly impact these populations.

Additionally, seven families with transgender or nonbinary children, along with advocacy groups, have filed a lawsuit against President Trump's executive order halting federal support for gender-affirming health care for those under 19. The executive order stops funding through programs like Medicaid and TRICARE, affecting access to necessary medical services.

February 6, 2025: Trump Administration's Policy Shifts: Potential Impact on Special Education, DEIA, and Federal Funding

As of February 7, 2025, the Trump administration has initiated significant changes that could impact services for children with special needs. Notably, efforts are underway to dismantle the U.S. Department of Education, aiming to reduce federal oversight of schools. This move could affect programs like the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), which provides funding and support for children with disabilities.

Additionally, the administration has taken steps to eliminate Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Accessibility (DEIA) initiatives within federal operations and among federal contractors. This includes prohibiting private organizations from conducting DEIA employment programs for jobs created by federal contracts. Such actions may influence the availability of inclusive services and support for children with special needs.

On January 22, 2025, President Trump signed an executive order titled "Ending Illegal Discrimination and Restoring Merit-Based Opportunity," which terminates Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Accessibility (DEIA) initiatives within federal operations and among federal contractors. This order prohibits private organizations from implementing DEIA employment programs for positions created through federal contracts. The administration asserts that this move aims to protect civil rights and promote merit-based opportunities.

Federal funds, which form over a third of state-government revenues, come with mandates that remain even when funding decreases. Major cuts are anticipated across federal-state programs including Medicaid, education, emergency management, housing, and nutrition, heavily impacting state responsibilities for social safety-net services.

Executive Orders and Policy Changes:

Rescinding DEI Initiatives: President Trump signed an executive order directing federal agencies
to eliminate Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) considerations from their operations. This order
mandates the termination of DEI-related offices, positions, and programs within the federal
government.

- Federal Contracting Revisions: The administration has instructed that federal contracts should no longer consider a company's DEI practices in procurement decisions. Existing contracts containing DEI clauses are to be renegotiated if they have six months or more remaining.

Administrative Actions:

Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE): Led by Elon Musk, DOGE has initiated significant
layoffs across multiple federal agencies, including the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services
(CMS) and the National Institutes of Health (NIH). These actions aim to reduce perceived
inefficiencies and have resulted in operational disruptions, such as the abrupt closure of the JFK
Presidential Library.

Widespread Layoffs: Since January 2025, DOGE has overseen the termination or layoff of thousands of federal employees across various agencies, including the Department of Veterans Affairs, Education Department, Department of Health and Human Services, Department of Homeland Security, IRS, National Park Service, Consumer Financial Protection Bureau, Agriculture Department, and State Department. These actions aim to streamline government operations and reduce spending.

Approximately 75,000 federal employees have accepted "deferred resignation" offers, while numerous probationary employees with less than a year of service have been laid off.

Program Freezes: Major grants, loans, and foreign aid programs have been frozen, leading to significant disruptions in federal services and operations.

Inspector General Dismissals: President Trump has dismissed at least 17 inspectors general, raising concerns about oversight and accountability within the government.

- **Elon Musk's Role:** While Elon Musk serves as a senior adviser to President Trump, the White House has clarified that he is not officially part of DOGE. His role is advisory, focusing on reducing federal spending and eliminating waste.

February 20, 2025: Trump Administration Moves to Dismantle Department of Education

The Trump administration is actively pursuing plans to dismantle the U.S. Department of Education (DOE). President Trump has expressed intentions to shut down the agency, leading to widespread concern among DOE employees about potential job losses and the future of educational programs.

In line with these plans, the administration has nominated Linda McMahon, former CEO of World Wrestling Entertainment, as the new Secretary of Education. McMahon has indicated a desire to restructure the DOE, aligning with President Trump's goal of eliminating the department. She has suggested reallocating certain functions to other federal agencies, such as moving civil rights enforcement to the Department of Justice.

A significant aspect of the dismantling process involves the Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE), led by Elon Musk. DOGE has been tasked with identifying and cutting what it deems unnecessary government spending. This initiative has resulted in substantial layoffs and the defunding of critical departments, including Education. Critics argue that these actions are causing severe disruptions to essential services without effectively reducing government debt.

For instance, Connecticut schools have been given a two-week ultimatum to eliminate DEI initiatives or risk losing federal funding. Additionally, the potential dismantling of the DOE raises questions about the future of federal student loans. The department currently oversees a \$1.6 trillion student loan portfolio. The DOE plays a crucial role in enforcing these provisions and distributing federal funds to support special education.

Potential Impacts on IDEA and IEP Services:

• Funding Disruptions: The DOE allocates substantial funds to assist states in delivering special education services. Dismantling the department could lead to uncertainties in funding distribution, potentially resulting in reduced resources for special education programs. This financial instability may hinder schools' ability to provide necessary services and accommodations outlined in students' IEPs.

Effects on Children Served by Made To Move Pediatric Physical Therapy:

 To Move, potentially overwhelming available resources.
- Increased Demand for Private Services: Families might seek external providers to fill gaps left by public schools, leading to higher demand for outpatient pediatric physical therapy. While this could expand our client base, it may also strain our clinic's capacity and resources.
- **Financial Strain on Families:** Without adequate school-based services, families may need to bear the financial burden of private therapy, which could be challenging for many, potentially limiting access to necessary interventions for some children.

Impact on the Pediatric Outpatient Physical Therapy Market:

- Market Growth: An increase in demand for private services could lead to growth in the pediatric outpatient physical therapy market. Clinics may need to expand their services, hire additional staff, or extend hours to accommodate the influx of patients.

February 21, 2025: Medicaid on the Chopping Block? Senate Budget Moves Spark Debate

Recent developments in Washington, D.C., indicate potential significant changes to Medicaid funding. The Senate recently passed a Republican budget resolution by a 52-48 vote, aiming to unlock \$342 billion in spending over four years, with equivalent offsetting cuts. This resolution sets the stage for the budget reconciliation process, allowing legislation to pass with a simple majority, potentially facilitating President Trump's fiscal agenda without needing Democratic support.

Notably, President Trump has sent mixed messages regarding Medicaid. On Wednesday, he endorsed a House budget that includes significant cuts to Medicaid, just hours after publicly assuring that the program would remain untouched. This contradiction has led to confusion among lawmakers and concerns about the future of Medicaid funding.

Senate Democrats have expressed alarm over the proposed cuts, warning that the House Republican budget could include billions of dollars in reductions to Medicaid. They argue that such cuts could strip healthcare from millions of seniors, disabled Americans, and children.

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February 26, 2025: Medicaid Funding Reductions

On February 25, 2025, the House of Representatives narrowly passed a budget proposal aligned with former President Trump's agenda, which includes substantial cuts to Medicaid. The proposal aims to reduce Medicaid funding by \$800 billion over the next decade, raising concerns about the potential impact on healthcare coverage for low-income individuals. These cuts could significantly affect hospital systems and insurers, leading to stock declines for companies like HCA Healthcare and Molina Healthcare.

- Could potentially make the referral and billing aspects a bit simpler overall and might reduce time to achieve these tasks on behalf of the patients

Questions that arose during research

- How would the use of Al/Virtual reality be billed? Would they charge the provider or the patient for the use of equipment and how can they ensure that the patient is using equipment properly?
- How would AI/VR using facilities approach the older generation who struggles with technology when using the equipment?
- If meant to help patients in rural areas, what happens if they need access to internet/data services but cannot afford it? Would a mifi or hotspot be provided by healthcare providers or insurance?
- Despite updated coding and algorithms, how would they ensure that the AI documents properly while using voice function especially since siri for example has been around for years and doesn't always properly hear what the speaker is saying and also has increased difficulty with understanding different accents
- Meta stated they wanted to incorporate motion sensor technologies to incorporate into rehab therapy, but how are they going to ensure sensors are constantly updated and calibrated to capture proper motion and movements?
- Even though AI would have databases incorporated about medical diagnoses, how would we be sure it doesn't take the whole "webmd" jump approach to patient diagnoses?
- Though they provide database backups in case of breach, how is their method to EHR's different or better than what is currently being used?

- How would the AI be coded to be empathetic of patients who experience chronic pain and frequently return due to needing constant care and also how would that affect the preemptive treatment plans?
- Despite having form/technique correction, how would AI detect if a patient is struggling with a specific exercise vs bad form, and how would they make pivots based off of patient vs database coding stand point?
- How would employers anticipate to set aside time for required continued learning by incorporating AI/VR within their practice and would that responsibility fall under the office's responsibility or would it be the 3rd party (AI/VR supplier) responsibility to train?
- How would AI know if and when patient intervention needs to happen?
- How will they ensure personalized and unbiased treatment plans and would they also be coded to have awareness of different religious backgrounds that may pose potential issues when it comes to treatment plans?
- How can we ensure AI chatbots are giving patients full responses to questions that they
 may ask instead of going around in a circle and not fully answering or addressing issues
 patients may bring up? (like calling the bank and trying to get to a specific person but it
 instead reroutes you to a general options menu and won't let you speak to an actual
 person)
- What happens if the network crashes during a work day? Would we still be able to access records or would it bring the office to a standstill?
- How would the pivot remote care for those using VR (meta) if they are prone to motion sickness and cannot complete therapy virtually?
- How do we know if it's better and more effective using AI/VR versus the methods that are currently in place and being implemented now?

 - Family doctor in Tennessee uses AI to help create medical notes for treatment plans and billing. Originally these would take 2 hours to complete on his own, but with AI and little editing he managed to cut time down to 20 minutes worth of work
 - Clinical psychologists by using AI to create automating responses to frequent client questions, appointment scheduling and appointment reminders
 - App called Zapier which can connect to google calendar and other apps
 - A licensed professional counselor uses it for writing assistance for case notes, treatment plan templates, & clinical documentation.
 - Leaves out PHI and then asks ChatGPT to format into DAP or SOAP note format and then goes back to add additional and required information.
 - These serve as blank templates that employees can copy, paste, and edit and then send
 - Once ChatGPT does the formatting for case notes, counselor then goes back to review and edit notes and then finalizes task

- Doctor also trained ChatGPT over time by giving feedback about exactly how they wanted the notes to look and by doing so template was able to change to desired design

Medicaid Funding and Proposed Cuts

The current administration has proposed significant federal spending reductions, potentially impacting Medicaid. In Connecticut, officials are concerned about the effects on 1.2 million residents relying on Medicaid. Proposed national cuts of up to \$880 billion over the next decade could lead to a \$1.3 billion loss in federal funds for Connecticut, affecting services like long-term care facilities.

Until both chambers pass the same version of the budget resolution and move into the reconciliation process no official cuts to Medicare or Medicaid can happen. Until there is approval on both sides there is no timeframe for when this budget resolution will be passed. Right now the House of Representatives hasn't passed its version of the budget resolution due to the internal disagreement among the house of Republicans particularly over the size and scope of the cuts and accompanying tax changes.

In March 2025, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) announced a reorganization plan, including merging five agencies into a new Administration for a Healthy America and reducing the workforce by approximately 20,000 employees. This plan has faced criticism and was enjoined by a District Court in May
